He said he emailed everyone who has e-mail about the opportunity to obtain olive wood from trees being cut down in Ventura. A number of pieces were present.

He congratulated **Bill Nelson** who won first place in the **Expert Spindle Category** and **Herb Harder** who won a first place in the **Advanced Miniature Category** at the **Wood Pride West Show** and presented **Bill** with his award and accolades. **Herb Harder** was not in attendance.

Bill went on to tell us of the upcoming Old Pasadena Summer Festival. Ray Leier from del Mano Gallery has offered us a fantastic opportunity. A booth to demo and sell turned wood pieces at the Old Pasadena Summer Festival on Memorial weekend. The festival consists of the following: Play Boy Jazz, Tastes of Pasadena with various restaurants, Family Fun Fest with rides and amusements, and the Summer Art Festival with 120-130 artists. We then went on to our Presentation on **Surface Decoration–Hand Carving** by **Chuck Korian**. **Chuck** made a fine presentation and passed out materials with notes on decoration. He answered many questions and there was great interest shown. Thanks **Chuck**.

We then had our **Natural Edged Bowls Challenge**. We had many challengers and judges **Mike Kane** and **Paul Grisanti** gave 1<sup>st</sup> place nod to an outstanding piece by **Dave Holzberger** and 2<sup>nd</sup> place to **Curtis Thompson**. It was very tough to pick between these beautiful entries. **Dave** got a \$25 gift certificate to Craft Supplies and **Curtis** got first pick free, on the raffle table.

## SHOW AND TELL

Carl Stude showed a very nice walnut goblet.

**Randy McDonald** showed his nifty cowboy hat of pearwood.

**Curtis Thompson** had a 6" by 9" natural edged bowl of Brazilian Pepper with 3 coats of tung oil and buffed. A 6" by 7" natural edged deep bowl of spalted buckeye burl with 3 coats tung oil and buffed. These were great and the latter one won second place in the challenge.

**Dave Holzberger** showed 5"H x 12" Wide natural edged vase of maple burl. It won  $1^{st}$  place in the Challenge and a manzanita bowl 4" H x 7' W. Beautiful work.

**Carey Caires** brought her spalted maple bowl with a natural edge. A beauty.

**Steve Dunn** brought a plethora of big hats. 5 big hats of walnut, 2 ash hats, one of silver maple and one of river oak plus 3 mini hats, 2 of madrone and one of myrtlewood. Great.

**Bill Haskell** showed an enclosed bowl of elm with impregnated green dye, a black walnut natural edged bowl with sapwood/heartwood contrast and a natural edged vessel of maple burl. Wonderful.

**Mark Fitzsimmons** showed his walnut burl piece with a spiked edge and a walnut "vessel" with lots of holes. Great work, **Mark**.

**Paul Grisanti** had a cocobolo cane finished with Danish Oil, a cocobolo hour glass with wax finish, A pair of black walnut candlesticks with 4 coats of oil finish, 4 pine open twist pieces 161/2" tall.

**Chuck Korian** had a 14" Basswood bowl burned (pyrography) decoration. A beauty.

**Dick Lukes** showed his excellent open top carob bowl 7" x 9" with CA finish.

**Amos Thompson** brought a wood hat of maple size 8 ¼ with lacquer finish. Very nice.

**Linda Hovenden** had a natural edge redwood burl plate, a natural edged maple multicenter bowl, a natural edge maple vase and a natural edge apricot mini bowl. Beauties.

**Pete Carta** had an 18" ambrosia maple bowl with lacquer finish off the new **Oneway Lathe**, a natural edged bowl 3" high of maple burl and 4 spinning tops—3 of cocobolo and one of cherry. Good work, **Pete**.

**Ralph Otte** had an olive bowl, a mesquite bowl, and a maple bowl all finished in carnuba shellac. Fine work.

Al Sils showed a river oak closed form, a myrtle platter, a box with pickup sticks and a redwood bowl inlaid with silver. Spectacular work as usual.

**Bob Barnes** our miniaturist had 4 wine bottle stoppers with ball and race. Very handsome.

**Cal Eshoff** brought 12x12 square center piece of different materials made of Biocomposit (paper and acrylic). Very unusual.

**Don Comer** had a group of lacquer finished natural edge bowls of yellow pine, manzanita burl, masur birch, silver maple and maple burl. Great work.

**Bill Pounds** brought an olive natural edge, a walnut **Stude** wood bowl and a mystery wood bowl.

**Bill Foster** showed his unique infinity light made of oak 24x 24 made on the lathe.

**Bill Noble** had an olive bowl with natural edge, a liquid amber natural edge, a burlwood natural edge and a distorted fruitwood natural edge for the challenge. Good Good pieces.







# Other income includes Sealtite sales, Challenges and Miscellaneous

Our financial condition this past year, 1999, ended in the black. In total, income of \$8,457 exceeded expenses by \$322, or 4%. If the onetime purchase of a lathe were excluded, as well as workshops, which are essentially a pay for service, then the cost of operating our organization was \$4,761.

With \$1,985 from our year-end auction providing the largest share of income, the monthly raffle raised a similar amount - \$1,872. Donations were \$774 and other miscellaneous inputs equaled \$371. Thus, recurring expenses were \$4,761, \$241 less than income. We paid for our Crescenta Valley Park facility last year for both 1999 and 2000. The fee for using the LA County building we use was \$520 in 1999 (for 10 months), which grew to \$840 for the current year. All in all, our finances are in good shape thanks to the willingness of our members.


