

Brigantines Report by Bill Kelly

A display case has been placed at the visitor' gate to show some of the turned pieces we have donated to the project. These items are offered in exchange for donations. Tops, kaleidoscopes, small boxes, and doorstops are popular items.

Bill Kelly displayed lamps made from laminated whiteoak frame cut-offs and distributed several blanks (with holes drilled as requested) to **GWG** members who wish to donated a lamp body. **Bill** will do the wiring and the project will furnish the lampshades. These lamps are presented to

donors who have contributed over \$2500 to the **Brigantine Project**.

We will soon be supplied with $3" \times 3" \times 36"$ mahogany blanks to turn the stanchions on the taff-rails. These are of a simple spindle design, easily within the talents of almost all of us.

The ships are growing daily as the shipwright are installing engine mounts, watertight bulkheads etc. Sheer strakes the first planks have been fitted and the frames are being cut off to finished lengths. Deck beams are almost all in. Several of the spars and yards are complete and some sail making is underway. Launching is planned for the second quarter of 2002.

The project needs someone to turn a couple of stanchions from a 4" x 4" x 72" blank. Who wants to volunteer? We are planning an Arts and Crafts Fair again this year on Oct 27-28. The club lathe will be on hand. This is an opportunity to display your talents and handiwork for fun and profit. Sale of items made are split 50-50 with the **Brigantine Project**.

SHOW AND TELL

Bob Barnes showed 12 "Wood Pile" clocks for the ships, and a lidded container. Very nice.

Art Fitzpatrick had a masur birch hollow form that won first prize professional faceplate at the Orange County Fair. Terrific.

Geneva Comer (9 years old) showed off her beautiful lidded box of bloodwood and finished with arborwax. Wonderful.

Proud grandpa Don Comer brought a natural edged bowl of black acacia with laaquer finish, a "square edge" bowl with hand carved edge made of lacewood and finished with lacquer. Very beautiful work.

Bill Kelly had a very unique goblet with both captive and satellite rings from walnut. A gift for **Carl Stude's** furniture maker's wife.

Carl Stude showed a child's commode of alderwood, painted white with maple handle and walnut knob. This editor is speechless in La Crescenta

Dick Lukes showed his incredible "Eye-Con #21," an aluminum ball within a concave tube on a bored out maple column. Wow.

Amos Thompson had a lamp, ball holder clock, a 10" x 22' lamp- oak and Pine shade, a 6" x 15" walnut lamp with camphor shade, a 4" x 4" myrtle clock, a 4" x 5" ball holder of myrtle— all had lacquer finish. Whew.

Mel Foncanon brought a set of four nesting bowls, roughed out of green camphor using the McNaughton System. Turned to the first sanding and sealed with a washcoat of tung oil, bagged and let dry. When dry there was no sign of cracking and little distortion which **Mel** credits to the washcoat, however he had a lot of dark stains, he thinks it's probably, from sealing in the moisture that subsequently required a lot of sanding. He also had a small apricot bowl, finished with seven coats of tung oil. Wowee.

Bill Haskell showed two small natural edge maple bowls with interesting spalting and coloration. A lacquer finish rubbed out with 0000 steel wool gave a nice rich finish and A "Better Half" piece of spalted buckeye, which was cut in half, and rejoined with an offset. Laminated black fish paper provided the filler and demarcation for the offset. The piece was finished with lacquer and rubbed out. His usual unusually fine work.

For those of you looking for a change of pace, **Cal Elshoff** will be hosting the October meeting. He will also be the handling the **George Hatfield** demonstration on October 13.


Its time to start searching for treasures for the Great Christmas Auction to be held at the GWG December
