

Brigantines Report by Bill Kelly

We had great weather as we completed our last two day-sails, May 27th and June 3rd on **Swift of Ipswich** and **Bill of Rights**. All together 54 members and friends of **Glendale Woodturners** and 13 from **Inland Woodturners** participated! Many toured the brigantine boatworks prior to sailing. Several people signed up for additional volunteer work. Many thanks.

On the brigantines, deck beams are being installed, deadwood is filling the bows and stem frames and breast hooks are complete and the diesels (Caterpillar #320-280 HP) are being fitted. The final midship clamps (Douglas fir—6 inch x 10 inch x 40 feet) are kiln drying and should arrive soon.

As a special treat, on our final day sail, both boats paraded by the new **Banning's Landing Museum** to honor their opening day. **Bill's** first cannon salute was not impressive. **Swift's** was much louder. **Bill's** cannon was reloaded and that salute reverberated throughout the waterfront.

SHOW AND TELL

Bill Nelson showed a closed vessel, of old growth douglas fir, embellished with red wire and finished with a matte CA finish. (The wood is from the **Brigantine Project**), a box, made from laminated white oak with Mylands friction polish finish, (The wood is from the **Brigantine Project**) and he showed us a 24 in. long pin that broke as he was roughing it. The grain was going at a 45-

degree angle. He felt his helmet saved his face from taking the impact of the wood hitting him in the face.

Don Comer had a maple candlestick for 4 in. diameter candles with a lacquer finish, 2 walnut candlesticks, (a matched set) with left and right hand twisted stems with a lacquer finish. His challenge entry was a green pyracantha candlestick with a lacquer finish. This was one of the first pieces that **Don** ever made.

Bill Haskell showed a multi-center wall piece made from mahogany that was turned on six centers using five individual pieces. He also had a mahogany multi-center table sculpture with two pieces also turned on six centers.

Amos Thomson won the challenge with a matched pair of candlesticks made from manzanita. **Amos** could not make the meeting but had **Steve Dunn** deliver the pieces.

Mick Sears brought his turned box with lid made from juniper and a pencil pot made from carob. It's color was increased by exposing it to direct sunlight for 3 days.

Michael Kane showed 2 maple burl square edge bowls, and 1 cocobolo square edge bowl.

Al Sils delighted us with 2 myrtle bowls with silver & gold inlay. As usual, **Al's** work is impeccable.

Steve Dunn had pictures of **Stuart Batty's** class at his home. Next meeting he will have pictures of **Guilio Marcolongo's** class. **Steve** seems to have expanded his business.
