The mahogany billets (50) were cut for the taffrail stanchions. I was showing them to **Jim Root** in Torrance. He's volunteered to make all of them

for the project! **Jim** runs Aberoot Mfg Co., specializing in archetectual turnings. His father and his son represent three generations of woodturners.

Watertight doors have arrived as well as jackscrew assemblies for the rudders. Work has begun on rudders of pupleheart body and tatabu trailing edges. Covering boards are being installed of beautiful joinery. Yards and booms are finished and they are now working on the top masts. If you would like to make a monetary donation to the project, now is a good time. Until Nov 16th an anonymous donor is matching all contributions of \$1000 or more, matching \$2 for \$1.

SHOW AND TELL

Bill Kelly had single double and triple twist goblets of mesquite, walnut, holly, and honey locust. Also a goblet with twist stems of ebony and holly, rosewood and holly. Terrific.

Steve Jacobs had a 9 candle candelabra of black acacia and carob and a (non) square edged carob bowl. Very nice.

Mel Foncannon showed a bark edge sugar bowl with lid out of olive wood with a tung oil finish and Beall buffed. Nice work.

Dick Lukes displayed a boxwood goblet (Thailand) with a fluted stem, an Acrylic Box w/ 6 incised interlocked circles on the lid, and an English walnut box. Extraordinary. **Dick's** goblet won the challenge.

Steve Dunn had 2 goblets one of ebony and one of red gum and 4 hats, one large one of ash, one large

one of magnolia, one mini of olive and one mini of madrone. They are terrific as usual.

Justin Vasquez had a cherry fluted bowl finished with oil. He got the idea from a book. Nice work.

Carey Caires showed her tiny goblet out of ambrosia maple. Just great.

Carl Stude had a 4mm x 32mm tiny ebony goblet. Very good.

Bob Williams displayed one of his first tries—a goblet from walnut with a clear wood finish. Very nice.

Mark Fitzsimmons had a truly extraordinary turning from and elm burl. It is a hollow form multi-center piece that is truly fantastic. He has named it "WhoVille"

Brian Williams showed a black walnut wine stopper with clear wood finish and a walnut goblet. Very nice.

Bill Haskell shared a mahogany wall sculpture in five pieces with an off-center concentric design turned on seven centers. The piece was mounted on a dark metal colored background with standoffs. Also, a wormy English walnut hollow vessel was shown that was turned with the Lyle Jameson hollowing trapped boring bar. Bill brought his new boring bar and attempted to explain how it works and how much less stress and muscle is involved in using it than hand or arm held hollowing tools. He also told how the tool provides better control and less vibration when deep in a vessel and he explained how a laser pointer mounted on the tool gives an indication of wall thickness and shows the operator where the tool tip is inside the vessel.
