It's especially important to let us know you are coming to these events so we can calculate the amount of food we need to provide for lunch.

Brigantines Report by Bill Kelly

Our crew of shipwrights has swelled to 35 as we begin planking. The process is called spiling. Patterns for each plank are made. Planks are cut, faired, steam bent, and fastened. Lower planks are 2 3/8" thick, tapering to 2 1/8" as they approach the waterline. The top 5 courses are Douglas Fir, the balance are South American Locust (courbril) and Batse, another jungle

hardwood. Cutoffs from the hardwood planking will be used for belaying pins



SHOW AND TELL

Bill Kelly had hollow vessel of laminated white oak, a hollow vessel of laminated white oak, purpleheart and courbril, a lidded container of ½inch laminated oak, and a purpleheart goblet with twisted stem and scalloped base. All are finished with lacquer and all will be donated to the Brigantine Project.

Don Comer brought a cocobolo scoop finished in **arborwax** and a maple kitchen spoon with a salad bowl finish. Beautiful.

Bob Stumbo showed his kalidiscope he made under the tutelage of **Bob Cobert**. Very nice.

Wes Hall showed off 12 pens made from various woods and finished with lacquer. Just great stuff.

Cal Elshoff had a 13" natural edged avocado bowl. Very good work.

Phil Pandolfo showed his ash bowl finished with tung oil. Nice piece.

Floyd Pedersen brought a maple-lidded box, 2 almond vases, 2 square turnings of silk oak and walnut. Very nice.

Carl Stude showed off his old oaken bucket made of 12 tapered laminated staves with a lignum vita handle bearings finished with lacquer. It won the challenge. Need I say more?

Michael Kane showed a black acacia hollow vessel, a carob hollow vessel, and a chechen square edged olive bowl. Really nice.

Dick Lukes had an S-shaped vertical mahogany sculpture 24" high with 7" quilted maple disc (dyed yellow). Very unusual piece.

Carey Caires showed off her pie server made with a pink ivory handle and an ebony blade. Outstanding and won the challenge.

Steve Dunn had a big leaf maple burl square edge bowl and a silver maple burl hat. Terrific work.

Ed Hotchkin had an ugly (according to wifey **Cathy**) green hollow form and a large spalted maple bowl. I liked them both.

Al Sils bought a redwood bowl with inlaid silver and gold with wire brushed rim, a spalted acacia bowl with inlaid silver, gold and copper with textured rim and a myrtle closed form with copper and silver applied eagle with carved free form opening. Outstanding as usual for Al.

President's Column

In last month's newsletter I introduced the hardworking members of the club officials. This month I'd like to acknowledge the tremendous contribution that the rest of our volunteer crew makes. In no particular order, they are: Carl Stude; who salvages the fine walnut (Stude wood) from a furniture factory for our raffle. Carl also has several anonymous volunteers who help him surface the wood so we can see the figure of the wood as we make our choice during the raffle. Steve Dunn; who stores our club lathes and accessories and transports them to wherever we need them to demonstrate. Bob DeVoe; who, in addition to serving as treasurer, also stores and brings our PA system to the meetings. Ralph Otte is our official "scrounger" and Sealtite salesman. Ken Pazera tries to guess how much coffee to make for each meeting, depending on how many are going to show up and how cold the weather will be that day. Cal Elshoff maintains the cold soft drink supply, while Cathy Pearman is in charge of the refreshments for the regular monthly meetings. The refreshments and lunches for the separate demonstrations are presently sort of a group effort with Jackie Comer taking a lead role. There are also many volunteers, too numerous and modest for me to even be aware of, who make the

club the enjoyable experience it is. We all owe them a great big debt of thanks.

Because the club has been accumulating surplus cash for the last several years, the board has decided it would be desirable to reduce club income to more closely match our expenses. Here is a summary of the changes we will make:

- Pro Demos: Reduce normal fee by \$5. Lunch will still be furnished at the demos; any deficit will be made up from the club's treasury.
- Club Member Demos: Eliminate normal \$5 fee.
 Light refreshments will still be furnished.
- Club Challenges: Eliminate normal \$1 fee. We will also increase the value of the Challenge prizes by an unspecified amount.
- Refreshment Donations (Money donated at beginning of each meeting): No change.
 Refreshments are already being sustained by additional food donations by several of the club members.
- Raffle: No change. The raffle is already a good bargain for the money spent.
- Library: No change, but increase annual budget to \$300. Bill Nelson feels there are a lot of books and videos out there that will make a great addition to our library.

As a reminder: The **del Mano Gallery's** "Turned Wood – Small Treasures" show starts on March 2 and runs through March 30, with an opening reception on March 2 from 2:00 till 5:00 PM. The Gallery is located at 11981 San Vicente Blvd, Los Angeles, (sometimes called Brentwood).

Dan Hogan has been doing a yeoman's job on getting the 2002 program lined up. I've either seen the work, or at least pictures of the work, the professional turners do that he's selected and I think we're going to have an outstanding year this year. Of course, the members who have volunteered to do demos and presentations are going to make it mighty interesting too.

The Challenge was any kitchen or dining room handled item. The winner of the "Advanced" class was Carl Stude with an "old oaken bucket." Loaded with nostalgia, I might add. It was of staved construction with a bent wood handle and lignum vitae hinge pins to resist wear. Now if he can just find an old well to use it in. Carey Caires won the "Novice" class with an exquisite pie server made from ebony and pink ivory. She won't be in the Novice class very long if she keeps up this kind of work.

After the break, I kicked off the President's Challenge with another harebrained nutty idea I had. We handed out Tagua nuts to 26 members who had never won a challenge prize before. The nuts must be turned into a piece of art and returned for entry in the President's Challenge in the April 14 meeting. The nuts can be

combined with other materials as long as the nut is the major portion of the finished piece. Criteria for judging will be for overall excellence. It should be interesting to see what comes back. I think most of the members who took the nuts had never turned Tagua nuts. Good luck, guys, and gals.

After the Challenge kickoff, I gave a talk on the basics of producing a quality finish. This was decidedly pointed toward the beginning or novice turner and I hope at least some of newer members benefited from it. If you missed it and you are at all interested, it is now posted on the club's website www.woodturners.org.


