We selected AI Sobel and Ralph Otte to judge the Tagua Nut Challenge. See the presidents column.


Brigantines Report by Bill Kelly

SHOW AND TELL

Bill Haskell might have set a record this month for the most entries in Show &Tell, including a handsome vessel featuring a pierced mosaic design around the circumference, which was turned from Western Big Leaf Maple Burl. (photo attached) Another of Bill's entries was a matched pair of tall vessels with a carved opening. These were Silver Maple with an attractive flame figure brought out by a lacquer rubout. Bill's final entry was a natural edge bowl of peach burl with a polished lacquer finish.

Carey Caires entered the miniature class with a tiny taugua nut and ebony goblet finished in nontoxic oil, and two bottle stoppers. The bottle stopper knobs were of blood wood and box elder.

Cal Elshoff entered a Liquid Amber salad bowl, a Buckeye Maple goblet, and some cocobolo dishes, all very well crafted.

Steve Dunn entered his extraordinary western hats, one large hat turned from White Ash, valued at approximately \$800 and two smaller ones turned from Madrone Burl. They are finished in Deft Lacquer. Many ordinary turners can't even imagine how these hats are produced, Maybe Steve can be persuaded to hold a Saturday session someday and show us how it's done.

Craig Sobel entered a Cocobolo hollow ball, a long stem goblet, and an absolutely fascinating mechanical model whose most prominent part was a wood-fashioned bicycle chain.

Bond McGaffey kept busy this month constructing a very attractive segmented bowl from Walnut, Zebrawood, Maple and Sycamore. He also constructed a fine executive toy, a

kaleidoscope featuring Oak and Cherry tubes.

Amos Thomson also entered the miniature arena with a Taugua nut turning that was designed to serve as a domicile for the worlds smallest bird or possibly an oversized bumblebee. He also submitted a rather large (13" x 10") winged bowl of Birdseye Maple, and a more conventional bowl of old growth Redwood, both Deft finished.

Ed Hotchkin's entry was a green maple vase that was bleached and then colored and finally finished with a copper foil rim, a very imaginative effort.

Dick Lukes submitted an art piece that would be a certain attention-getter in any stylish living room. It was an a symmetrical disk offset in a diagonal harp. The parts were Poplar (finished natural), Maple and Mahogany (both dyed). The final finish was buffed shellac over wax.

President's Column

Well, I had a good time at the April GWG meeting. Did anyone else?

The Presentation for the April 14 meeting was a very interesting talk, by **Kevin Wallace**, on "The

Current State of Turning as an Art and Craft." **Kevin** is a freelance curator and consultant on wood art for prominent galleries and collectors. First he gave us a discussion of the evolution of wood turning from a "craft" to an "art" and the ongoing struggle to define what is a "craft" and what is "Art," with a capital "A." After that he started to critique the items on the Show and Tell table and had just gotten warmed up for the job, when I was forced to cut him off because of a lack of time. Both **Dan** and I understood **Kevin** would only need 20 to 30 minutes to complete his talk. If I had known he was planning to critique each and every piece, I would have scheduled things much differently. I got very positive feedback, laced with polite complaints, from some of the more advanced turners in the club, that I had not allowed enough time for **Kevin**. On the flip side of that coin, I got other comments, from some of the novice turners, that it was a waste of time. I guess, if you're the GWG president and you're not making everybody unhappy from time to time, you're not doing your job. To give Kevin enough time to discuss all the turnings brought in for his perusal, we will have to devote the entire time usually spent on the Presentation and Show and Tell to just that. We may try to do that next year, so if you have an opinion, pro or con, be sure to weigh in early with either **Dan** or me.

We had a lively response to the Tagua Nut Challenge. I had members accuse me of giving them rotten and defective nuts, but believe me, it was all Mother Nature's doing. Some folks said we really had a "challenge" in the club "Challenge" this time, which was part of my evil scheme. Floyd Pederson and Lane Thomson won first and second prizes respectively with their exquisite little lidded boxes made almost entirely They seemed especially of the Tagua nut. appreciative of the prizes, more Tagua nuts! (Or did I just imagine that?) Steven Small won third place with a little jewel of a goblet, which incorporated ebony and paduak inlays. Stephen told us he had to pick the remnants of the nuts up off the shop floor three or four times before he could complete it. Now, that's persistence for you! By the way, they also got gift certificates to Craft Supplies for their efforts. The rest of the entries were pretty impressive too. I'm glad I wasn't one of the judges.

Cathy Pearman handed out a survey form on "Why Did You Select Your Wood Lathe?" We

would like to provide more useful information for newer members who are looking to buy a lathe or upgrade from their old one. So please fill in the form and bring it back to the next meeting or fill in the form posted on our website.

Dan gave us a run down on upcoming club activities in the near future. He's been working hard on getting things planned but we'd like some ideas for interesting presentations and we still need a demo and demonstrator for September. We'd like to hear what you'd like to see.

Dan also handed out seventeen turning blocks for the Same Size Block Challenge. They are to be turned into anything the entrant desires but must be finished and brought back for the June 2nd Challenge. I was surprised at the member's enthusiasm and how quickly they volunteered to enter the Challenge. The club furnished the blocks free to the turners. Do you suppose that had anything to do with their enthusiasm?


