A ramp will be set up and the balls entered into the challenge will be judged on how straight they role across the floor. It has been a fun challenge in the past and many round balls have been entered. If you have never made a round ball, it's a good time to do so. You can come up with your own method, there are articles out there on how to, or call a club member or friend to get some ideas. It would be great if everyone entered a ball and make the meeting more fun for you. Because of the size of the shoot, it is recommended that the balls be between 2.5 and 5.5 inches in diameter.

Don Comer gave a wonderful presentation on "Carving Ribs on a Wooden Vase". He brought in a finished vase and one partially finished so he could demonstrate the various stages of producing the finished product. He also brought in the jigs he uses to hold the vases and the tools he uses to carve and scrape the wood. Don is a true craftsman. He does beautiful intricate work to near perfection with the simplest of tools, most of which he made himself or he adapted existing tools. One of his finished products is in the centerfold of the "American Woodturner" summer 2004 edition along with a collection of some of the clubs best works.

Last fall, Ray Leier from del Mano came to a meeting to talk about the pieces members brought for his review and he selected some for the picture gallery of the AAW magazine. Eight club member pieces are displayed in the centerfold of the "American Woodturner" summer 2004 edition. 






This amazing display of goblets produced by Pete Carta was entered in this month's Challenge but only garnered 2nd place in the advanced category. Tough competition!
