

Pete Carta gave a very good presentation on sharpening jigs. He had a model of a grinder with wheels and explained how a variety of sharpening jigs worked. He discussed how to adjust the angle on your tool and various jigs to get back to the same angle every time. Pete as always put a lot of effort into his presentation and it was very informative. The follow up to this would be to go to Bob Devoe's hands on tool sharpening workshop at his shop (studio) in October. Also Bob will be giving a presentation on grinding wheels at our March meeting.

The club has decided to get a booth at the "Old Pasadena Summer Fest" to held Memorial Day weekend (May 29-31) at Brookside Park adjacent to the Rose Bowl. At the summer fest there will be live entertainment, international

foods, a children's area, a sports zone, and over 100 fine arts and crafts exhibits. We presented it at the last meeting and got quite a few sign ups for demonstrators and hosts, but there is still plenty of room for more. The shifts start before the show opens and end after closure for set up and cleanup and the shifts overlap for a smooth transition. Each of the three days (Saturday, Sunday, and Monday) the shifts will be from 9:00 to 1:15, 12:45 to 5:15, and 4:45 to 9:00 and you can sign up at the next meeting or contact me. This is a fun event and a good place for the club to show off its work and encourage new members. The challenge at the February meeting was something off center and even though there weren't many entries, the pieces were very interesting and well done.

Ray Ford took the novice prize with his beautiful redwood "Compote" off center art work finished in lacquer.

Terrell Hasker took the intermediate prize with two neat multi centered ladles made from flowering pear and finished in walnut oil.

Mark Fitzsimmons took the advanced prize with one of his four large pieces. I believe it was the hollow form with the off center foot shown below.

Jim Givens talked about a beautiful rosewood bowl with mylands finish. He must have made it on his new lathe.



Floyd Pederson brought in three pieces. A lidded box made of English walnut and maple, an oak bowl, and the exquisite walnut and maple segmented bowl shown below.



Bill Noble talked about his amazing five axis' lidded box with handles made from oak and finished in oil. I couldn't follow his explanations, but really liked the piece shown by Bill below.



Ray Ford is consistently showing us his pieces with interesting twists to them. One was an avocado hollow form with raised dimples and bleached and the other was also avocado, but had egg shells glued in a pattern. Both were very unique.

Bill Haskell presented four pieces with great design, workmanship, and finish as usual. A pecan hollow vessel (11 inches), a hollow vessel with S-shaped tuxedo opening made from California buckeye, a vessel with carved and pierced free form design with charred edges made from big leaf maple, and a Brazilian cherry sculpture turned on four centers.



Steve Jacobs showed two well done off center candlesticks made from walnut and mahogany and finished in tung oil. If you are interested in his work be sure to come to the April meeting at which Steve is presenting.

Pete Carta displayed a beautiful 3 centered rosewood scoop and turned hearts made from ash shown below. Pete always seems to put some fun into turning and Valentine's Day was no different.



I just came back from taking a class with Christian Burchard in Oregon and this was very evident by the pieces I showed. I brought in a couple of madrone burl baskets and three hollow walnut spheres with the off center arcs shown below.
