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

CHALLENGE

The challenge this month was Easter Eggs. Again **Ed Hotchkis** stepped up to be a judge along with **Bill Noble.** It was not a really big contest this month as there were no novice entries and only one intermediate entry and the rest were



advanced. So by Presidential decree the two categories were combined and the winner was Jay Jackson from the intermediate category. That may move him up to advanced next time. That has become a very

competitive grouping.

Here is Jays winning egg, made from leftover airplane plywood from the collaboration project. It was nicely decorated in inks with a nice lacquer finish.

And here is a group photo of all of the advanced

category eggs.



The very small hummingbird egg was turned by our queen **Carey Caires** from Holly with the inside painted yellow and finished with Mylands

Terrell Hasker with his egg turned from Buckeye on Sunday morning and a second coat of finished applied just before leaving home and dried on the dash board of the car on the way to the meeting. This is not a highly recommended practice for fine finishing your projects but perhaps Terrell could do a presentation sometime on speed turning and finishing. What about that Terrell? Jim O' Connor turned his egg from Carob and finished it with lacquer and wax. And Pete Carta laid out eight eggs turned from Crape Myrtle, Redwood, Maple and Ash and they all had their own cup/stand.

Show and Tell

Jim O'Connor brought in a full sized cowboy hat turned out of Liquid Amber and finished with Lacquer spray.



Nick Tuzzolino brought in two pieces. The first is a segmented vase of Bloodwood, Maple and



Mahogany.

Nick's second piece is a natural edged bowl turned from Mulberry. What a wonderful natural yellow color in this wood. Who knew?



New turner **Stephen Powell** also brought in two pieces. His very first bowl ever turned is from Mango and has a Hazelnut oil and wax finish. The oil was out of the pantry and was what he had on hand. Another resourceful turner!



And the second

bowl was turned from Buckeye and again finished with Hazelnut oil and wax. This one was turned thinner than the first. He attributed this to some mentoring from several club members.



And another new turner **Steve Leffert** brought in a bowl turned from Kauri that he bought on a trip to New Zealand. It is finished with



Mineral oil.

Demonstration



The above photo was taken by **Bob Fahrnbruch** and shows Binh Pho in action with those wonderful green wood shavings flying all over.

The photo pretty well tells the story of the day. things flying by. Some of those things I caught and others were over my head or really out of my skill range but Binh made it all look so easy and he was so encouraging too. And he was quite free with helpful hints as many of our professional demonstrators have also done. He freely gave out sources for all of the materials he uses to make his fantastic creations including phone numbers or web sites, whichever he had. These are also included on his DVD "Design-Airbrush/Piercing". Binh started out with a piece of Steve Dunn's two month old Ash. That is practically all dried up for Steve! He turned this down to a bowl with sides about 1/16th of an inch thick! Then he gave us a Power Point Presentation on his finished work and talked about how the pieces were created. He spoke quietly of his separation from his family in Vietnam when he was just 19 years old and his four year struggle for freedom and reunification with his family. All of those things have found their way into his work. There is a lot of his life experience and culture in his inspiration for his work. His artistic eye is always on the lookout for some new inspiration. After lunch he showed us his airbrushing and piercing techniques on a piece of 1/16th inch plywood. This will appear in our December Auction so start saving that money to beat out Bob DeVoe.

I am both inspired and overwhelmed but I also take away a great quote from Binh, "The more useless the object the more you can charge for it." Thank you Binh for the humor and skill you bring to woodturning.



PRESENTATION



Al Sobel gave us a presentation on lidded boxes. His handout was from a past demonstration given by the late Steve

D'Arc and written up by **John Tarpley**. If you were not present for this review then the hand out is posted on our website. Al differs a little from Steve in the form area. His personal preference is for a division of fifths of the box, with the body as 3/5's and the lid as 2/5's.

Al said that the hollowing process is pretty mechanical and therefore he generally uses a larger size drill bit with a morse taper on his lathe to hog out most of the interior. Then you can follow-up with your scrapers or gouges, whichever



you prefer.
His most important tool however is a depth rule. With it you measure the inside depth so

you don't make that mistake of going thru the bottom of your piece. His depth rule is also used

to check for square on the sides as well a checking for a flat opening edge.

Al brought in several examples of his work and encouraged us all to use those "precious" small pieces of wood we all save to make some boxes of our own. Al is our lidded box mentor so don't hesitate to contact him for some help. Thanks Al!
