



tachometers." It seems like a simple process but like many projects it has multiple facets to it. Do I have the correct motor or do I need to buy a new one? Ok now I have the motor, what VFD do I get? Now I need the switch box and a tachometer for all of this. So, there are lots of decisions and a lot of switching and placing various components before you get to turn your lathe back on. This is not exactly a beginner project so keep Franks phone number close at hand for technical advice. His handout will be on the web site soon and there is a list of sources that he provided.
