

CHALLENGE

We had another great turnout for this month's challenge. The judges were **Terrell Hasker** and **Al Miller.**

In the Novice category we had four entries from



Stephen Powell. A yew and mahogany double box, another turned from boxwood, the next was amboyna burl and African Blackwood and the fourth was from Bocote. All finished with oil and beeswax.

Robert Haugaard had a great coffee cup with



spoon turned from walnut and mystery wood and finished with lacquer.

Bill Loitz turned a box from walnut that took

second place at the Cerritos College student appreciation day.



Bernie Huberman brought in a great little maple box finished with wax.



And the winner in the Novice category was Paul



Schmit with his cocobolo and ebony box with an insert.

Carl Christensen had a walnut and Wenge box finished with oil.



Ralph Chamlee brought in an arrowhead oak box with natural (bark) edges that he finished with



sealer, Deft and wax.

Cal Elshoff brought in the winner in the Intermediate

category with his Douglas fir and mahogany box modeled after the one on the Craft Supplies catalog cover. It was finished with Water lox.



Floyd Petersen brought in two entries; the first was of walnut and the second of walnut and bird's eye maple; both finished with tung oil.



Jim Givens brought in two boxes. The first was black acacia, spalted maple and ebony. The second was zebra wood, maple and ebony. Both had a CA and lacquer finish.



AI Falck brought in four boxes with turned and carved finials made from oak, redwood, carob and alder and all finished with lacquer.



Jim O'Connor brought in a spheroid box made from Bubinga and <u>finished with oil and wax</u>.



Dave Hergesheimer brought in two very creative lidded boxes. The first one he called "Mars over the moon" and was made from a walnut burl and maple that was spray painted and finished with lacquer. The second was a cookie jar complete with turned mice peeking out of the knot holes. It was turned from black acacia, walnut and carob with a lacquer finish.





Our **Queen Carey Caires** brought in three mini boxes. The largest was an ebony and pink ivory homage to Cindy Drozda. And the other two were turned from olive and were pagoda style boxes.

That is a penny at lower left for scale.

And last but certainly not least were two entries by **Dick Lukes**. The first was a shallow box from desert ironwood that was reminiscent of a hockey puck. And then his second box; the winner in the advanced category; was a threaded cocobolo box.



SHOW AND TELL

There were more great turnings for show and tell again this month. First off was **Floyd Pedersen** who brought a redwood square edge bowl.



Ralph Chamlee brought in two bowls. The first was a nine inch elm bowl that was burned and dyed. The second was a six inch Arrowhead oak nut bowl.



Tex Isham brought in another of his wonderful sculptures from tupelo swamp wood that I think might be similar to swamp cypress. It was left its natural color but Tex may dye it before it goes to his gallery. I liked it just the way it was.

Next was **Cal Elshoff** with three pieces. The first was a 14 inch Purpleheart bowl. The next was a seven inch square dish turned from curly walnut. And the third was a five inch bowl from a composite wood, all had lacquer finishes.





Craig Sobel brought in another segmented piece. This was an ebony, tulipwood and maple vase that is spiraling 34 segments high. It was finished with polyurethane. I am continually impressed by the work that Craig and others turn out.

PRESENTATION

We had several of our members bring in jigs, tips or fixtures for this months presentation. Queen Carey talked about using a bendable plastic ruler that you can purchase at the drug store or office store inexpensively that you can bend around your turnings to mark lines or divisions. She also talked about using those eye makeup applicators from the drug store to apply finish to small objects. And she brought in her power sander that started out life as an electric tooth brush that she has sanding disc's for that were cut from the standard 2-3 inch ones. Craig Sobel brought in his newly made table saw sled for making those segmented pieces for that hollow vessel he brought in this month. Dave Hergesheimer brought in a home made depth gauge, an aluminum faceplate, a diamond dresser for his grinder and a safety center also all home made. Jim Givens brought in his shop made steady rest. Dick Lukes talked about buying gasket material from the auto supply store to use as padding when rechecking his pieces. Also he bought shaft collars from the hardware store to use on his tool rest to keep it at a fixed height for removal and replacement. He brought in a flexible hose purchased from Rockler that he uses for lathe dust control. It's flexible enough to put on the tool rest to get almost all of the chips and dust. Bill Loitz brought in a plastic chuck he uses when turning baby rattles to hold the handle end of the rattle. AI Falck brought in several tools he had made for hollowing.
