

CHALLENGE

As **Queen Carey** said there was a small turnout for the challenge this month but we had enough for a pretty fair competition. The first entries were from **John Doyle**. He had one of Lignum Vitae and a second from mystery wood.



The next entry was from Steve Veenstra who

won in the over 2 inch category. His top was turned from Acacia and Walnut with a tung oil finish.



Sandy Huse brought in an unusual style top made from mystery wood with a wine cork on top. Very interesting.



Jerry Davis brought in a Maple top finished with lacquer and wax.



Earleen Ahrens brought in a brightly painted Maple top for the competition.



Dan Hogan brought in two tops of an unusual design. They appeared to be Ebony and Maple but as usual Dan was very brief in his description so this is a guess on my part. The design principle is to keep the weight concentrated on the bottom for a low center of gravity and therefore a better and longer spin.



Queen Carey Caires brought in a brightly colored top in the **Bonnie Klein** style that she learned several years ago in a class with Bonnie.



And the winner in the less than 2 inch category was **Robert Manning** who brought in two tops. One was Padouk and the other was Padouk and Pine. Both were finished with carnauba wax.



SHOW AND TELL

There were quite a few turnings brought in this month. We started off with **Floyd Pedersen** and his two bowels and a tray. The natural edge bowls were turned from Elm and the tray was out of some Mesquite. All had a tung oil finish.



Robert Manning brought in two more of his terrific segmented bowls and a bowl from his "mid-century" period. The first one was White Oak cut on the bias with a Bloodwood center element. He calls it "Oh England." The second one called "Burgundy Crescendo" is composed of Purpleheart, Curly Maple, African Blackwood, Ebony and Bloodwood.



The third one entitled "Moss Transit" is made from Baltic Birch and dyed green. All have a lacquer finish.



Jim O'Connor brought in another of his cowboy hats. This one was turned from a great piece of Oak.



Bill Haskell brought in two more of his hollow forms. Theses were turned from Olive with the CA and lacquer finish.



Lou Hansen brought in a segmented bowl turned from Oak, Purpleheart, Padouk and Maple and finished with lacquer.



We had **Terrell Hasker** bring in several of his latest bowls turned from walnut.



Craig Sobel brought in a large bowl turned from Norfolk Island Pine with an oil finish.

PRESENTATION



Frank Guarino. our Guild Vice President, gave us а great presentation on thread chasing. Most of the time you would expect a live demo with a lathe etc. but that would have limited the view to just a few people at a time so Frank did a projected presentation with really good and large visual

aids. The thread chasers were about 10 inches wide and were used to show the techniques required in cutting both inside and outside threads. His tips included a reminder that none of the tools are ready to use when purchased. Remove any partial tooth with a small belt sander and round over and smooth the bottom edge of the tool. Make sure your tool rest is smooth and flat. Frank also gave a list of some woods that are more suitable for threads than others. He said Boxwood was the best but others include: African Blackwood. Rosewood. Brazilian Tulipwood. Pink Ivory, Satine, Bloodwood. Cocobolo, European Yew, Pau Amarillo, Lignum Vitae and Snakewood. There are also some plastics and machinable waxes that can be used as well. Turning at a slow speed is also essential, approximately 300rpm.
