

Challenge

There was a small turnout for the challenge this month but at least all of the categories were represented again. So in the Novice category there were three entries. The first was a hollow form by **Bill Loitz** made from Mahogany and Poplar with acrylic paint, silver leaf, patinated with a shellac finish.





The next entry was a bottle stopper turned by **Frank Kopecky** with a bit of a sparkle to it. This one is for a real celebration!

The winner in the category was **Scott Connors** with his bowl with burned in cherry blossoms. The wood was Tulip Poplar with a CA finish.



In the Intermediate Category was **Steve Dunn** with his Madrone cowboy hat and his natural edge bowl.



The winner in the category was **Joyce Burton** with her wonderfully carved and burned Ash natural edge bowl. Magnificent!



In the Advanced category Jim O'Connor brought in an Oak baseball cap with the burned in initials of his alma mater Saint Francis. Are you sure that's not those other guys, the San Francisco Giants? It had a lacquer finish.



VP **Frank Guarino** brought in a Maple hollow form that was dyed and finished with lacquer.



Queen Carey Caires brought in three brightly colored fishing lures ready to go into the stream with their very sharp hooks! They were turned from Holly, Ambrosia Maple and Yellowheart. They were affixed with various beads, feathers and metal.



Robert Manning brought in another of his well done segmented bowls turned from Maple with the segments highlighted with red dye. It was finished with lacquer.



The winner in the category was **Paul Schmit** with his 8 inch Carob bowl with dyed Alabaster inlay. He also brought in another 8 inch bowl from dyed Poplar with Hokusai's Mt. Fuji from Kanagawa painted on it with acrylic paints. Both had tung oil and varnish finishes.

There were lots of turnings brought in again this month. We started off with **Steve Veenstra** and his two boxes. The first was turned from Brazilian Pepper and had an ebonized lid. The second was a winged bowl of Acacia with a Walnut lid. Both have a lacquer finish.





Robert Manning brought in a second of his terrific segmented bowls. This one was turned from Cherry and finished with lacquer.





Bob Coleberd brought in an inside out turning made from Mahogany and Carob with a lacquer finish.

Al Miller brought in two more three sided hollow vessels. The first was turned of Curley Pyinma. And the second was turned from Eucalyptus Burl, Blackwood and Ebony. Both with a Tung Oil and lacquer finish.



Kathy Hein brought in a bowl turned from Apricot and finished with Mylands Friction Polish.



Rick Hoard was really productive this last month while his wife was out of town. He brought in five new pieces. The first was a Sheoak natural edge bowl. The second was an Osage Orange bowl.



The third was a Rose Myrtle lipped bowl. The fourth was an Ebony bowl and the fifth was a Black Acacia bowl. All had a CA finish.

PRESENTATION

Dave Hergesheimer gave us a right brain presentation on dust collection. He basically gave us a virtual tour of his shop dust collection system. This included the basic garage sale box fan positioned to pull dust out of the open shop and the standard shop vac. The shop vac can be used to vacuum up the dust and debris after a project or hooked up to a fixture of some kind to pull dust directly from a project. This could be a downdraft sanding box or a lathe for example. He also talked briefly about respirators but the main event was his 110V 1100CFM dust collection system. The system has two four inch diameter PVC runs that go around his shop. It is fully grounded. It also features blast gates at every branch. There are drops to every machine and some extra drops for future machines or to temporary work stations. There were photos of the machines and the various connections and Dave gave excellent explanations about his system. This included how certain machines were hooked up and why they might be hooked up another way. Some fixtures were bought off the shelf and some were made as custom pieces by Dave to fit a specific piece of equipment. There was a lot of helpful and useful information but then I expected no less from a retired shop teacher!

Saturday Demonstration

We had a really nice turnout for our first demo of the year. **James Santhon**, who just happens to be the President of the Orange County Woodworkers, was our guest demonstrator. It was a return visit for him; he was last here in January of 2006 when Queen Carey was just beginning her reign.



He started out with a lidded "jar" turned from Goncalvo Alves that he said had been laying about his shop for several years. His tools of choice are the new *Glaser Hitec* turning tools; I think his particular favorite was the 1" spindle

gouge. This first project was the most time consuming but well worth the time spent. When he was done you had to look hard for the seam

between the top and bottom.



The second project was a Quilted Maple platter that was about 10 inches in diameter. He made this one look so easy but I know from my own experience that this was not really that easy! It was also refreshing to know that even a fellow with 30+ years of turning can get a catch on a piece he is turning. As James said: "Wood is magnetic, it will grab your tool and pull it in even when you say I wasn't that close!"



The third and last piece that James turned was a Cherry goblet. We were starting to run out of time but with a little encouragement from the attendees James pressed on. The goblet was turned and sanded in about 30 minutes!



It was a great day at the park and we all came away with some tips and tricks from a master turner who resides just "down the road".



Look for these in the December auction and start saving your money now to get these, it will be worth it. Queen Carey has a good grip on them here.
