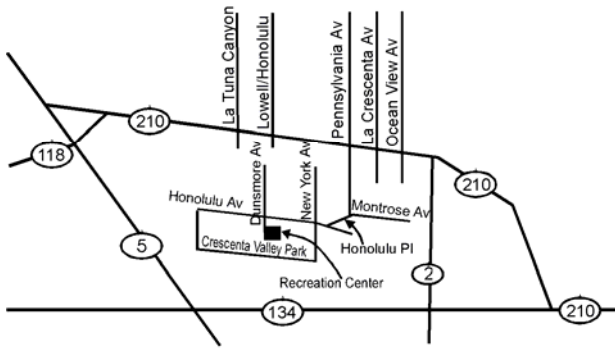

**CHALLENGE**

There was a very small turnout for the challenge considering the large number of people at the meeting; hopefully next month will be better. So in the Novice category there were two entries. The first was from **Scott Connors** with his controversial cup. He argued successfully that it qualified as an alternative material even though it was from a **Parallam® Beam**. He used a polyurethane finish.



The winner in the category was **Carol Dresben** with her "Orca" pen turned from acrylic.



In the Advanced category Dave **Hergesheimer** brought in two entries. The first was a square edge bowl turned from Trex® and a spun vessel from aluminum.



**Bob Fahrnbruch** brought in a bullet pen from a spent brass shell casing using a 7mm pen kit.



**Dick Lukes** brought in a miniature goblet with captive rings turned from brass. This was about 1 ½ inches tall and could definitely compete with Queen Carey in the mini category. I did not realize

**Paul Schmit** brought in another show stopper with his "Tiki" turned from volcanic rock, antler, rawhide, Tagua nut amethyst and carnelian. There was also a lot of carving involved in his entry.

**Rick Hoard** brought in three different bowls. The first was from a Maple Burl, the second was Rosewood and the third was Bubinga, all had CA finishes.



**Dale Gertsch** shared his first and then latest turnings with us, there were a few years between the two. The first was an ice cream scoop with a Maple handle and the other was a large Elm platter with an oil finish. Nice work Dale.

## PRESENTATION



**Craig Sobel** gave us a very thorough demonstration of the Worksharp 3000 sharpening system. This appears to be nice and compact and his two page evaluation will be available on the web site.

The tools' footprint is smaller than a standard grinder but keep your grinder for those hollow ground tools. According to Craig you can grind any rounded surface tool while actually observing the face of the tool being ground. This helps prevent faceting the tool. After seeing Craig's presentation I think I may have to agree with Queen Carey, I will have to go out and get this tool.
