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

The challenge this month was gifts you have made and we had a pretty good response this month and again there were entries in all of the categories.

In the beginner category we led off with **Deanna Hemphill** who brought in two candle holders; one turned from Carob and the other from mystery wood. Both had a wax finish. Great idea **Deanna**.





Lou Hansen brought in a 10 inch pepper mill made out of seven layers of Maple, Ash, Purpleheart and Walnut with a lacquer finish.

PJ Hays brought in an adjustable stainless steel back scratcher made from Bocote and finished with EEE and Shellawax



Jack Stumpf brought in two entries. The first was a clever turned Teak box that was made into a clock. And the winner in the category was his Carob bowl finished with lacquer.





In the Intermediate category we had **Sandy Huse** and her bowl she titled "Zag" turned out of Ash and finished with walnut oil.





Nick Tuzzolino was the winner with pepper mill turned from Cherry, Maple and Bloodwood. It was finished with polyurethane. Nice work Nick.

In the advanced category our **Queen Carey Caires** led off with her unique gift item for the golfer. She turned three golf tees. The first was out of Olive; the next out of a green composite wood; and the third out of Redheart. All were finished with Mylands and then buffed.



Then we had **Frank Kopecky** with his clever handle for a small digital camera. It had a threaded insert and was turned out of Dymondwood and finished with Mylands.



Then there was **Bill Nelson** with his spiral ornament of Holly and Bloodwood with a CA finish.



Floyd Pedersen made a duck call out of Walnut for his hunting friends. It had a wipe on finish.



Amy Earhart brought in a stainless steel ice crème scoop with a Bloodwood handle. It had a EEE and Shellawax finish.



Jay Jackson returned after a long absence and brought in two pens he had turned. The first was a Rollerball style out of Redwood Burl and the second was a slim line style out of Multiwood. Both had a friction polish finish.

of pine with a tung oil finish.



Floyd Pedersen brought in two turnings made from Olive. The first was a tray with Lapis inlay and the second was a natural edge platter. Both had a wipe on finish.





Al Miller brought in a Chilean Laurel Burl. Maple Burl, Ebony and acrylic lidded box with no finish as of the meeting.





Henry Koch brought in a small hollow vessel out of Carrot wood that was an urban harvest recently. It has no finish on it yet, it is still drying out.

And last but not least we had Bill Nelson bring in



a spiral wand of Macassar Ebony and a spiral walking

staff of Kubota wood. And what is Kubota wood you ask? Bill explained that it was wood that came off of a pallet that held a Kubota tractor therefore it was Kubota wood. Nice job on the twist and triple the custom made brass tip on the stick. Here he is with his walking stick.

PRESENTATION

Our presentation was about turning acrylics and Amy Earhart had a wealth of information to share. She provided a handout with information about where to buy plastic rods in various sizes and colors. And she passed a few acrylic rods around so we could get a sense of what they feel like. Then she showed us a beautiful ice cream scoop that she made out of red acrylic. What a great gift idea, not only because it's so useful, but because the bright red handle can be easily seen in a drawer with various cooking items. Amy talked about sanding using Abranet, a wire mesh, and Trizact discs which are a special abrasive from 3M made for plastic and acrylic. She also uses Novus #'s 1, 2 & 3 polish's which are liquids. Novus #1 also works well on face shields and safety glasses. We also learned that there are different types of acrylic and for our wood turning equipment, we should use cast acrylic instead of extruded. There were a number of comments about sanding (do it lightly), and use of steel wool or Brasso (good ideas). System Three Quick Cure 5 epoxy glue was recommended although other acrylic specific glues are available. And it's very important to use protect our lungs when turning acrylics. Thanks to Amy for a very informative presentation. Now it's time to turn something for the next challenge!

Sunday Demonstration

We were pleased to have **David Ellsworth** on Sunday September 26th for an all day demonstration. **David** has been turning wood for

over 35 years and is a founding member of the

AAW and also an Lifetime Honorary member. He has designed deep hollowing tools that were for sale at our demo and are also available from Craft Supply and Packard Woodworks. He has a school of woodturning on his property in Pennsylvania where you can take a three



day workshop with him and a maximum of five students.

We were shown his techniques for turning a natural edge bowl and a hollow vessel. After lunch he shared a presentation with us of his pieces from beginning to the present. It was very interesting to see how his forms have evolved over the years and how he turns objects in a group or series. He currently seems to prefer little or no finish on his work often only using a Krylon UV spray finish to protect the natural color. On the natural edge bowl his tips included: balancing the



work, the design not the weight; using your body as the energy source for the cut; the bigger the base the better, it gives you better design choices for the final foot when

you turn it around into the jam chuck. Also try to keep your head or eye above the tip of the tool. He uses a ½ inch thick foam backer pad behind *Abranet* for sanding his pieces. His



general inspiration is early American Indian pottery forms; that is not surprising as he has a

Masters degree in sculpture and has worked in metal, fiber, polyester and clay. You can tell he is a teacher as he stopped often to show and explain what he was doing. He also gave a demonstration on how to sharpen some of the tools he uses. He uses some jigs and also does some freehand sharpening.

The hollow form he turned after lunch was a



'classic" shape in that it has been made out of clay, metal, stone or wood over the years. The outside shape was turned fairly quickly and then began the hollowing process. It was hollow, clear and blow many times over to get the shavings out. He showed his homemade thickness gauge

that he made from zinc plated rod from the local hardware store.

This was a demonstration from one of the world's Master turners and I think we all came away from it with an appreciation for the craft and skill that David has. If I ever decide that I want to tackle

deep vessel turning I will definitely enroll in

David's woodturning school.
