

CHALLENGE

The challenge this month was holiday ornaments and gift boxes. We only had one entry in the beginner category so we had to temporarily move up **Bob O'Brien** into the intermediate category. He brought in two ornaments; the



first was a snowman and the second was a sea urchin ornament. The finial and icicle are removable because the urchin is on temporary loan from his wife. Both were turned from Pine with a friction polish finish.

The winner in the category was **Lou Hansen** with his five assorted ornaments; two were turned from Juniper, one from White Oak and the other two were from Black Acacia. The finials and icicles were made from various contrasting woods.



In the Advanced category we started off with **Queen Carey Caires**. Her first entries were two snow people and a Christmas tree made out of Holly and Lignum Vitae.



Then she had a string of Christmas lights turned from color laminated wood and maple.





And the last entry was a maple ornament bottle stopper that was hand colored with great difficulty. It's top was purposely offset to give it a bit of character. All of the pieces were finished with Mylands and buffed with Carnauba wax.



Pete Carta apparently has been working like one of

Santa's elves in his workshop. He brought in a whole box full of ornaments turned from various woods. They were all sort of icicle like but several had shapes



and faces of snowmen. And then there was the tree of ornaments that were also all sorts of shapes, sizes and woods.

Jerry Davis brought in six different ornaments; three were birdhouse style and the other three were the ball and icicle style.



The winner in the category was a triumphant return for **Bill Nelson.** We haven't seen him in a while and now we know the partial reason why, he was working on this nativity scene. There are lots of woods used and it is finished in lacquer. It will be featured in our holiday auction this year. Thanks **Bill** and we hope to see you more often.



SHOW AND TELL

In show and tell this month we started off with **Vaughn McMillian** who brought in a platter turned from a Walnut crotch. He also brought in a set of nested bowls turned from Mesquite.



Jim O'Connor seems to have been very busy lately as he brought in a set of three hollow Oak vessels, an Oak bowl and a segmented Maple hollow vessel. All of the pieces had a lacquer finish.







Frank Kopecky brought in seam rippers; two made from Dynalux and one from Colorwood. All had a Mylands finish.



Pete Carta brought

in three "magic wands" that were turned from an old bar stool leg. (Woodturners are always

recycling wood,) He also brought in three small lidded boxes made from Walnut and Ash with a lacquer and bees wax finish,



Bill Loitz ended with a nice Maple platter with a lacquer finish.

PRESENTATION

Our presentation this month was about tips, tricks and jigs. Queen Carey Caires led off with her tip about using a Swiffer wipe to clean your glasses and face shields. She also brought in a pen assembly jig that Frank Kopecky made for her. Pete Carta brought in a handmade depth gauge and several wire wall thickness gauges that he had made. Bill Haskell brought in a caliper for checking the thickness of the top of your hollow vessel. He demonstrated its use on a vessel picked at random much to the chagrin of Jim O'Connor. Dick Lukes told us about going to a local hardware store and buying a stop collar for around \$2 to put on our tool rest to lock in a height. Bill Loitz gave us a couple of lacquer tips; use an undercoat of 2 part epoxy that you apply with an old credit card at a low angle so you force it into the woods pores. After curing sand with 220 grit and wipe with denatured alcohol. Then spray on three to five coats of lacquer.
