

Polish inspired Pysanky decorated turned Maple egg with a sprayed varnish finish. As judge **Dan Hogan** said, "We want to see more like this from you."



In the intermediate category we had **Vaughn McMillan** with his Ash hollow form that was influenced by south western Native American forms. It had an oil finish.



Sandy Huse brought in two entries. The first was

a mixed media memorial piece with a "Día de los Muertos" or Day of the dead influence. And the winning entry in the category was her "Kleine Voeten" or Dutch for "little feet". It was turned out of Camphor and had a



Walnut oil finish. A Dutch name but a kind of Egyptian or Central American influence. What a

melting pot (pun intended).



In the advanced category we had **Ed Hotchkin** and his hollow vessel of Buckeye with a CA and lacquer finish.



**Earleen Ahrens** brought in a trio of ethnic totems with one being a bowl on a pedestal. They were all turned from Ash then painted and in one case nuts and bolts were added. It was nicely done

with a personal use of the totem idea.



And the winner in the category was Queen Carey Caires with her peace pipe. It was turned from Osage Orange and decorated with various

feathers and beads.

<u>Challenges:</u> November – Mythical, symbolic

#### **PRESENTATION**

Our presentation was about photographing your work and John Beaver had props galore. We used the screen to project the images up so see object evervone could the to photographed and how the light affected it. John went into a very detailed explanation about camera basics which included ISO, shutter speed, aperture and depth of field. I cannot possibly condense all of that info down to fit in this column so if you need those basics then catch John at a meeting and ask him about them. The basic equipment that you should have are: a camera with some manual controls, a tripod, a cable release, a backdrop and a lighting source. Lighting is very critical as it will make the subject bright and attractive and give a sense of depth to the photograph. You can have a very elaborate set up or a very simple one. The simple one that John had was a cardboard box with a hole cut in the side and a flap cut into the top. The side cutout was covered with an opaque sheet to diffuse the light. The backdrop was taped inside and the light source was on a simple stand that could be easily moved. He placed a bowl inside the box and then proceeded to move the light source around until he achieved the look he wanted. This was an evenly lit piece with a small highlight and good depth of field so the entire piece seemed to be in focus. You generally want

1/3 of the object in front and 2/3 in back of the focal point. With today's digital cameras you get instant feedback and can change the lighting position or turn the object until you get the desired result.
