

# Challenge

We had a very good turnout for the challenge this month and had competition in every category. We started off in the Novice category with **Mike Toth** and his bowl turned from Brownheart with a Walnut oil finish.



**John Janssen** brought in two bowls. The first was turned from Ash and finished with wax. The second was a segmented bowl turned from nine different species of wood and finished with Minwax Polyurethane.





**Norm Leduc** also brought in two bowls. The first was turned from Yellow Birch and finished with walnut oil. The second was turned from Cedar and finished with boiled linseed oil.





Harry Thy brought in three bowls. The first was turned from a Maple Burl and finished with carnauba wax. The second was turned from Cherry and the third was turned from Madrone Burl, they were both finished with French polish.







**Willie Hamburger** was the winner in the category with his Ironwood 6 inch bowl with a lacquer finish. The void was filled with crushed turquoise.



In the Intermediate category we started off with **Steve Cassidy** who brought in a bowl turned out of Orange with a friction polish finish.



**Bill Clark** brought in a natural edge bowl turned from mystery wood and finished with an oil poly.



**Lou Hansen** brought in a 5 7/8 inch bowl also turned out of mystery wood. It was finished with lacquer.



**Carl Christensen** brought in three "layered" bowls turned from Cocobolo, Birch and veneers. They were all finished with Maloof oil finish.



**Henry Koch** was the winner in the category with his beautiful Curly Maple bowl. It was finished with a water based urethane.



In the Advanced category we started off with President **Bill Loitz** with his natural edge mystery wood bowl finished with oil.



Carey Caires brought in two mini bowls and a pedestal box. The bowls were turned from Olive and the box was turned from Black and white Ebony. They were finished with Mylands and orange wax.



And the winner in the category was **Pete Carta** with his Oak end grain bowl. He also brought in a Maple burl bowl. Both were finished with wax.



He also was compelled to share his "ugly" bowl turned out of Fig. It had no finish yet.



## **Show and Tell**

There was a nice variety for our show and tell section. We started off with **Ron Shaffer** and his very large Mesquite platter. It had a band of crushed turquoise around the edge and voids were also filled with turquoise. It had a salad bowl finish.



**Lou Hansen** brought in a segmented apple. It had 14 layers out of approximately 14 different woods and was finished with lacquer.



**John Janssen** brought in a Maple burl lidded box that was finished with Minwax poly.



**Willie Hamburger** brought in a 5 inch bowl made from scraps of formerly turned pepper mills. It was finished with Lacquer.



**Bill Hahn** brought in a pen and a bottle stopper that were both turned from Cherry. Both had a friction polish finish.





**Pete Carta** brought in a bowl turned from Podocarpus with a wax finish.



And we finished up with a teleidoscope and a kaleidoscope from **Bob Coleberd.** They were turned from multiple woods and finished with polyurethane.

## **Presentation**

We had a very good presentation by guild member **Chris Durkee** this month. It was a sort of 2 for 1 deal. He showed how to make a donut chuck and a coffee scoop that can be held in the chuck. **Chris** gave us a very



comprehensive five page handout, complete with color photos, with step by step instructions. His presentation was accompanied by a donut chuck that was completed and several completed scoops. **Chris** then donated the chuck to the library for members to check out and then use to make one for themselves.



The scoops were made from various species and then had a small mother of pearl inlay at the end of the handle. Sources for the inlay were listed in the handout. The idea for this project was from an article that appeared in American Woodturner, the AAW publication, in the August 2012 issue. The end of the presentation was wrapped up with some final thoughts such as; put masking tape on the scoop handle when it's in the chuck to act as a safety flag to protect your hand and fingers. And he also brought up different design ideas for the scoop like wood burning or chatter work.






#### Eli Avisera Demo

We had another informative demonstration by **Eli Avisera** from Israel on Sunday June 23<sup>rd</sup>. He made his signature bird and then his interesting long



spindle that is tear drop, bottle and goblet repeating down its length. He then turned a bowl, a "lady" pen, a lidded box, an off center square and finished up with a scoop. A full day with lots of tips and good commentary on what was going on. **Eli** taught a one day class to some of our members at **Bill's** house on Friday the 22<sup>nd</sup> and then was a featured demonstrator at the AAW Symposium in Tampa. It was a busy week for him!
